"We are not God. The Earth was here before us and was given to us." (67)



"We are not faced with two separate crises, one environmental and the other social, but rather one complex crisis which is both social and environmental." (139)


"There can be no renewal of our relationship with nature without a renewal of humanity itself." (118)
